An endeavor by SMLR's PhD students, Jacob Barnes, Alysa Hannon, Jiyoon Park, Justin Vinton, and Phela Townsend, along with the Center for Global Work and Employment is accepting proposals for small innovation grants from PhD students pursuing research on work that includes one or more of the following dimensions and has the potential to include the others: relevance to global dynamics or systems and/or underrepresented regions/voices in labor research; interdisciplinary framing and

accessible language; application to practice; and, broad relevance to the Future of Work(ers) discourse. "Our primary objective is the creation of an interdisciplinary, global forum of exchange and personal-professional connection for PhD students, with particular focus on connecting with students outside of the U.S., Canada, Europe, and Australia and/or who center non-Eurocentric voices in their research." In a contract that the **Center for Women and Work** secured with the Asian Development Bank, **Yana Rodgers** co-authored an article called "<u>Gender Differences in Access to Healthcare among the Elderly: Evidence from Southeast Asia</u>," which shows that fewer Asian families are caring for the elderly, and especially women, as intergenerational transfers from adult children to their older parents have fallen over time. The article is coming out in the Asian Development Review this month.

Todd E. Vachon with J. Mijin Cha, Dimitris Stevis, and Vivian Price are revising their article "Green New Deal for All: Toward a Worker and Community-Led Just Transition in the US" for the journal *Political Geography*. The article, which draws from the research we conducted through the Just Transition Listening Project (JTLP), highlights the role of academics in communityled research and considers the prospects for intersectional, broad-based movements pursing a Green New Deal (GND) for all. In particular, we argue that the process of the JTLP parallels the goals of the GND--intersectional efforts rooted in community knowledge for the development of a people-led GND.

Highlights of Women's Earnings in 2020

In 2020, women who were full-time wage and salary workers had median usual weekly earnings that were 82 percent of those of male full-time wage and salary workers. In 1979, the first year for which comparable earnings data are available, women's earnings were 62 percent of men's.
